ITEM IDENTIFICATION:

Minor Modification: Graduate Curriculum Changes, Institute for Management & Innovation (IMI), UTM

JURISDICTIONAL INFORMATION:

Under section 5.6 of its terms of reference, the Academic Affairs Committee is responsible for major and minor modifications to existing degree programs. All major modifications shall be reported annually for information to the Committee on Academic Policy and Programs.

GOVERNANCE PATH:

1. UTM Academic Affairs Committee [For Approval] (January 11, 2024)

PREVIOUS ACTION TAKEN:

Minor graduate curriculum changes, effective September 1, 2023, were last approved by the Academic Affairs Committee on February 9, 2023.

HIGHLIGHTS:

The Graduate Minor Modification Proposals (enclosed) outline Minor Modifications to new and existing graduate courses. These curricular changes are intended to have significant positive effects on a cumulative basis but are considered to be minor changes in the context of the UTQAP. Proposals for changes brought forward at this meeting were reviewed by the IMI Curriculum Committee on October 18, 2023, and then by the UTM Divisional Graduate Curriculum Committee on November 21, 2023. Proposed changes will come into effect May 1, 2024, as noted within each enclosed proposal.

This year three new courses are proposed by the Institute for Management & Innovation (IMI). The first, IMI1003H – *Independent Study*, provides an opportunity for students to complement their learning by pursuing questions of interest related to emerging and novel management and innovation challenges.

The second, *IMI 2990H – Special Topics in Management & Innovation I*, and third *IMI 2995H – Special Topics in Management & Innovation II*, allow students from IMI's programs to collaborate across disciplinary backgrounds to learn from leading scholars or practitioners housed within IMI.

The final proposal is a course title change from the Master of Management & Professional Accounting (MMPA) Program. This title change for MGT2261H from *Advanced Management Accounting* to *Financial Distress, Insolvency, and Restructuring* addresses feedback from students, faculty, and the MMPA external review to clearly differentiate course contents in managerial accounting.

Course Description

This course provides an opportunity for students to pursue a specific topic of interest relevant to their professional graduate program at the Institute for Management & Innovation. Under the supervision of an IMI-appointed faculty member, students explore an interdisciplinary issue, question, or challenge within management and innovation. A comprehensive final submission at the end of the course is expected to make up the majority assessment. The nature of the assessment will vary by project and can include (but is not limited to) a research paper, presentation, or manuscript. Students are responsible for finding a supervisor before enrolling in the course.

Academic Rationale

Briefly indicate the academic reason for creating the course, its impact to the program and unit, and the expected impact to students (both current and future).

IMI seeks to be able to encourage students to pursue independent study of questions related to emerging and novel management and innovation challenges. Additionally, this course may allow students to learn independently from leading University of Toronto faculty cross-appointed to IMI as well as Visiting Faculty. An independent study course provides the vehicle for these learning opportunities.

As an elective course, it presents an opportunity for students to work one-on-one with a professor to take a deep dive into an interdisciplinary issue, question, or challenge. This course will allow students to explore their interests while complementing their learning in their graduate program. In this course, students will hone their research, analytical, and critical thinking skills which are essential for their post-graduation careers.

Student impact of introducing this course is expected to be positive for incoming and current students as it provides the Institute with an opportunity for learners to customize their degree to their interests. It will signal to students that the Institute is willing to explore new

and emerging management and innovation topics. For example, students in the Master of Urban Innovation (MUI) Program or the Master of Science in Sustainability Management (MScSM) Program can craft opportunities to explore a topic in depth that is not covered elsewhere in the curriculum. In programs that have a capstone requirement, this course will not replace the capstone course. In other IMI programs, such as the Master of Management & Professional Accounting (MMPA), there is currently no room for elective options in the program; but efforts are being made at the program and unit level to investigate opportunities to create room for elective courses for these students.

The IMI Director will approve all supervisors and projects in advance of the course to ensure consistency in the expectations (of both student and supervisor) as well as across the proposed projects and assessments/ grades. A syllabus, developed collaboratively between the student and supervisor, must be submitted for approval to the IMI Director prior to enrolment in the course.

Learning Outcomes

- Analyze the contemporary significance of a topic, question, or challenge

This is the first independent study course in IMI. IMI will review each student's request for an independent study course to ensure there is no overlap with existing topics offered in IMI or other graduate courses outside of IMI.

Description of Proposed Change

Change in course title from "Advanced Management Accounting" to "Financial Distress, Insolvency, and Restructuring" and content to:

- 1. address feedback from students, faculty and the MMPA External Review Committee regarding by more clearly differentiating course content from other managerial accounting courses in Program;
- 2. streamline and update course content coverage over the life of the MMPA programin the area of Managerial Accounting; and
- 3. increase coverage of interdisciplinary areas within the course.

Academic Rationale

Briefly indicate the academic reason for the change, its impact to the program and unit, and the expected impact to students (both current and future).

The legacy version of the course focused purely on advanced management accounting topics. Starting this 2023-2024 academic year, the course has been changed to include interdisciplinary topics related to insolvency and restructuring. The course now brings together elements from financial reporting, financial statement analysis, debt contracting, valuation, insolvency law, and cost restructuring. Accordingly, the narrow heading of management accounting no longer reflects course content accurately.

This change acknowledges the recommendation from the recent external review of MMPA and addresses feedback from students and professors regarding overlap in terms of content between courses. Managerial accounting topics are taught over three courses, including MGT 1222 – Managerial Accounting and MGT 2260 – Management Control as well as this course (MGT 2261). This new course title better captures the course content covered in MGT 2261 and makes clear what topics are covered in this course (as opposed to the other two managerial accounting courses). The core curriculum will still be covered across the three courses and program learning outcomes will remain unchanged.

Consultation

We consulted with our students and professors. During the recent External Review of the MMPA, the course content overlap issue was also discussed. This change will address the points raised.
